Jesus chose 12 ordinary men as his disciples

During June and July we studied the disciples and on the first Sunday in August I talked about eleven of the twelve disciples and the characteristics associated with each of them. The congregation was then asked to name a member of this congregation which most closely demonstrated the characteristics of each disciple. From the results it is clear we think many of us have several of the characteristics the disciples illustrated in their lives. I think though one person said what we were all thinking, "We are all disciples of Jesus."

I hope if anything was learned during this sermon series it is exactly that. We are all called to be disciples and just like the first eleven disciples each of us has different gifts to share the story of grace which is ours because of the sacrifice of Jesus.

One of the first things I want to talk about is how ordinary these men were. According to John MacArthur, "they were perfectly ordinary men in every way. Not one of them was renowned for scholarship. They had no track record as orators or theologians. In fact, they were outsiders as far as the religious establishment of Jesus' day was concerned. They were not

outstanding because of any natural talents or intellectual abilities. On the contrary, they were all too prone to mistakes, misstatements, wrong attitudes, lapses of faith, and bitter failure-no one more so than the leader of the group, Peter. Even Jesus remarked they were slow learners and somewhat spiritually dense. In Luke chapter 24, verse 25, he says to the disciples walking to Emmaus, "Oh, how foolish you are and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared!"

'The things you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also.'

2 Timothy 2:2

Yet, with all their faults and character flaws-as remarkably ordinary as they were-these men carried on a ministry after Jesus' ascension that left an indelible impact on the world. Their ministry continues to influence us even today. And I hope by learning more about them we can also influ-

ence those around us.

Many of us want to put faith in Jesus as Savior but find it difficult to follow him as Master and Lord. Jesus called twelve people together, not just to teach them about discipleship, but to actually disciple them. He modeled what was expected of disciples and how to achieve it. The Gospel of John hints that Jesus' discipling of these men took about three and a half years. To become great at anything, a person needs time and practice-far more that innate skill, good blood, or intelligence. Experts have settled on ten thousand hours as the magic number for true expertise. It seems it takes the brain this long to assimilate all that it needs to know to achieve true mastery. If you calculate the time the disciples spent with Jesus, assuming they took a Sabbath but otherwise spent day and night with him for three years, it actually equals just over ten thousand hours.

I would suggest that we commit to continuing to learn from Jesus through reading the Bible, participating in Bible studies, participating in the life of the church, and in prayer to discern what each of us is being called to do to spread His word.
